1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

The fundamental aim of the institution was clearly defined by the founder of college, Pt. Gauri Dutt, a pioneer freedom fighter. He aimed at inculcating the spirit of patriotisms, developing the global leaders in different areas and preparing highly disciplined youth to serve the Nation in both ways- by extending the frontiers of knowledge and spreading the message of patriotism and nationalism to the people residing in the area all around. Deva Nagri College is one of the oldest and prestigious colleges of Northern India. The college, started in 1958, is a co-educational, Government aided institution, catering the needs of urban and rural population of nearby areas.

Initially, the college began in a few rooms of Deva Nagri Inter College hostel with B.Sc. classes having 25 students only but by 1968 a new building of Chemistry Department came into existence. Presently the college is running B.Sc. (Math & Bio.), M.Sc. (Bot., Zool., Phy., Chem., Maths), B.Com., M.Com., M.A. (Eng. & Eco.), B.Ed. & B.Sc. (CS). The college provides adequate research facilities in the subjects of Chemistry, Physics, Botany, Zoology, Mathematics, Commerce, Economics and English and several students have taken doctorate degree from CCS University, Meerut under the supervision of faculty members of our college in different disciplines.

In the past five years, the college has added a large component of building comprising a huge double storied block of covered area of 25000 sq. feet for Physics Department, Laboratories and lecture rooms. Another block of same areas for Mathematics, Economics, English and Physical Education Departments is under construction. The architect of all this progress is Honorary Secretary, Managing Committee, Deva Nagri College, Seth Daya Nand Gupta.

The college is managed by DEV NAGRI SHIKSHA SAMITEE as an organization of educational institutions i.e. Intermediate College, Post Graduate College and Polytechnic College, has people with ideas, thoughts and creativity who passionately nurture talent to achieve excellence. Deva Nagri Shiksha Samittee has a general body and 33 members of Executive Committee having teachers and non-teaching staff's representation also. The college is recognized under Section 2(f) and 12(B) of the UGC Act.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

The curriculum of all the programmes combine academic knowledge, fundamental skills, personality development and social & ethical values. In today's world, we use computers and internet in almost every field of our life. Most of the persons are not well acquainted with computers and instruments. The college, after considering this problem, proposed to initiate two certificate courses, one as 'Basic Computer Application' and the other as 'Instrumentation Training'. The aim of the courses was to literate students about the basic knowledge about computers and instruments.

Our faculty members participated in various bodies of different universities and colleges, such as BoS, Academic council and governing bodies during the reporting period. As per the reference to the New courses introduced in the college, we are guided by the C.C.S. University Meerut as per University Act and statutes. Thirteen papers are included in university syllabus, among the courses run in our college which are relevant to Gender, Environment and Sustainability, Human Values for the enrichment of curriculum. All these papers are taught in the college.

Some co-curricular activities which improve skills in the students for the life are necessary for the growth of the students. College managed to organize a yoga and meditation programmed every year. Students were benefitted by these programmes physically, mentally and emotionally. They learnt to let go the unnecessary things in life and to cope up with the stress. It makes life easier for them. In a similar way, students learn a lot when they get a different environment. They get an opportunity for the exposure of their personality. In this view, B.Ed students are sent to join other schools/colleges to complete their internship. In this process the students do their teaching practice in the classes allotted to them.

The college takes care of feedback. The feedback is collected by students, teachers, parents and alumni. These are analysed and remedial actions are taken accordingly to improve the overall system and environment of the college. tion of cultural activity, academic and research enrichment, vocational activity etc. as a part of its

quality ensuring activities.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The college is the primary choice of the students for admission. There are around 3500 students enrolled every year as regular and in self- finance departments. Students from other states also take admission in the college both in UG and PG. The college follows University and college norms for Reservation of seats during admission process. Care is taken for the disabled students which make just a fraction of the total amount.

The College has a staff of highly qualified teachers with NET and Ph.D. Most of the teachers have doctorate degree. They are quite experienced in their respective fields. Many teachers have also received awards at regional and state level. The full time teachers include the regular, self-finance and full time temporary teaching faculty. A mentor is assigned for a number of students from among the full time teachers. Each mentor takes care of the problems regarding learning and campus facilities which are communicated to the higher authorities.

The students are taught using conventional methods as well as latest techniques such as ICT. The teachers try to develop innovative and creative approaches in their teaching and learning methods. Students score top positions in University Merit, and qualify various competitive exams, such as NET, GATE, etc.

Students are evaluated for their performance in class through tests, mid-term exams, oral quizzes, etc. The internal evaluation system is reformed and modified from time to time. Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and non-biased. The student grievances are dealt with immediately and informed to higher authorities. For the college activities the Institution follows the academic calendar uploaded on the website. The programmes are taught and the courses completed in time. The programme outcome and the course outcome are attained through promoting the student to take part in various academic and cultural activities.

Research, Innovations and Extension

During the reporting period, Deva Nagri College has received grants for research projects- one Government Project and four non government projects. The college also received CPE grant from UGC and endowments funds from various trusts . Total grant and endowment received by college during last five years are **Rs - 11,101,342**. The College has **33** teachers recognised as approved Research Guides of CCS University, Meerut. The college has created an ecosystem for creation and transfer of knowledge through water, soil and food testing labs and the samples were tested free of cost for farmers & citizens. The College conducted workshops on **Understanding Academic integrity and practices to avoid plagiarisms in 2019**. About **278** participant (students/ professors) of different institutions have presents their papers in the workshop. Our college has a code of ethics to check malpractices and plagiarisms in research or to detect duplicate contents . Dr B.S.Yadav has been awarded **Sararaswati Samman -2018** by Uttar Pradesh Government . An award honour ceremony was organised by the college in the honour of Principal. **31** Ph.D were awarded in supervision of our faculty members within last five year. The research papers published in the UGC notified journals by faculty members during the reporting period are **136**. The total Numbers of books/ chapters in edited books and conference proceedings written by faculty members are **60**. Total no. of awards received by college during last five years through different extension activities are **09**. NCC, NSS, Rovers and Rangers, women cell and literary societies have conducted **94** activities in our college such as Swwachh Bharat Abhiyan, Aids Awareness and Gender Issues in terms of impact and sensitising students to social issues and holistic development. All P.G students are

involved in internship training programmes being offered by various industries and research laboratories. 20 functional MoUs were signed with the institutions, other universities, industries and corporate houses, through which they can increase their skills for exchanging ideas.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The college believes in the overall development of students and work to create a sense of bonding and belongingness in them. Some major areas identified for capacity building are :

To focus on providing multiple opportunities for learning and

To provide the Faculty members with necessary infrastructure to give appropriate guidance and knowledge to the students.

Our college has adequate infrastructure for teaching learning process. It is furnished with 40 class rooms, 27 well equipped laboratories and two Seminar halls with ICT facilities. There is an auditorium having a sitting capacity of 400 Persons, which is used for many cultural activities and debates etc. The total area of our college is 40470 sq. meters out of which approximately 2273.85 sq. meters are used for out door activities of students. There is a Gymnasium of size 267.85 sq. meters for badminton, chess and table tennis.

Our faculty members use innovative techniques to deliver their lectures, like ICT facilities to make the content easy to understand. The central library of the college is well organized and fully automated. It is computerized via software SOUL 2.0 . There are 294 rare books. Our college utilizes all the grants allocated for the books. We use National Digital Library to access E-resources. There is a internet connection with bandwidth 100mbps.

All the departments of our college have sufficient number of computers with Internet facility. The college campus is Wi-Fi with two well organized computer laboratories.

For community services, our college has a Food Testing Laboratory, Soil and Water Testing Laboratory and Rain Water Harvesting systems.

The college has adopted 05 villages under **Unnat Bharat Abhiyan** and one village under NSS to make villagers aware for population control, pollution control and for use of organic and Vermicompost, so that they can reduce the amount of chemical fertilizers and pesticides .

Student Support and Progression

The college helps the needy and economically backward students to get support in form of Government Scholarship, freships by college management, scholarship through Alumni Association, and individual scholarships etc,benefitting 37.57% students on an average during the reporting period.

The college takes good care of holistic development of the students. The faculty provides personal counselling, career counselling etc.College also arrange talks and programmes on career counselling,soft skills development,yoga and meditation from time to time.Guindance for competitive exams and remedial coaching classes are organised by faculty in the departments. The college has also started Vocational Education and

Tranning Programme for the aspiring students.

The college maintains good discipline through Proctorial Board, Anti Ragging Cell and Student Grievance Cell. Therefore, there has been no untoward incident reported during the reporting period. The career counselling and placement cell have successfully placed 138 plus students in various organisations during the reporting period. Besides, 55 students successfully qualified in state and national level examination.

The college students take active participitaion in sports like Athletics, Badminton, Basketball, Taekowondo, Shooting, Boxing, etc. Students have won many awards at National, State & University level in sports. College organizes youth fest every year in which students participate in games,cultural activities and other competitions. All the activities departments have their own societies to conduct academic and cultural activities. The college follow healthy tradition of “student council”elected through open voting system. The council help in the smooth conduction of various activities and maintenance of discipline in college.

The Alumni of this college are well placed in different spheres of society in India and abroad.Some noted alumni could make it possible to hold most respected position like Chief Election Commissioner, Vice Chancellor,Justice in High Court,IAS,IPS and prestigious position in Indian Army, etc.Most of them have strong bonds with their parent institution and actively participate as members of Alumni Association .Alumni contribution to academics through scholarships and “ Alumni Lecture series” is remarkable.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The vision and mission of the college are achieved through good governance, able leadership and effective management. The college is governed by a Governing Body of Dev Nagri Siksha Samittee, Statutes and Rules & Regulations of affiliating university. The college practices decentralization and participative management by involving all heads of the departments, teaching and non – teaching staff, students and the alumni at different levels of decision making. E - Governance exists in all aspects of admission, leadership and management.

The college follows the policy of democratic and participatory management. The college is committed to promote quality research and a Research Development Committee is constituted for monitoring and promotion of research in the college.

A number of welfare measures are provided for teaching and non – teaching staff of the college. The college has organized ICT based teaching training programme for teachers, training programme on working of FTIR spectrophotometer for teachers and research scholars, training programme for filing online income tax return and language proficiency training in English to teaching and non- teaching staff.

The college has a performance appraisal system for the teaching and non – teaching staff also. The college ensures enhanced academic research with a well equipped library and access to various learning resources.

The financial statements of the college are well documented and audited annually. The college initiates and takes all possible efforts towards resource mobilization and generation of funds not only from various government agencies (UGC, CSIR. ICSSR) but also from various others sources such as affordable fees from students in self finance courses, industrial donation for infrastructure development and alumni contribution for academics in the form of scholarships and `lecture series` for the benefit of students.

The Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) has coordinated various activities such as Academic Audit, Green

Initiative, promotion of cultural activity, academic and research enrichment, vocational activity etc. as a part of its quality ensuring activities.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

To generate a flux of good and smart citizens, college believes in promoting and planting universal values in students which result in social and communal harmony and national integration.

College provides safety and security to all its students and staff and there is hardly any case of ragging and grievances among the students. Being a socially responsible institution, the college is always available for various activities connecting the students to the social attributes, such as Blood Donation Campaign, Swachh Bharat Abhiyan, Gender Equity, Voter Awareness, etc. and provides its space and resources to the community.

To move towards environment consciousness, the college is replacing its old power resources by renewable energy sources such as solar lights. Waste Management, Rain Water Harvesting and Green Campus are also priorities of the college.

College is also sensitive towards divyangjan and tries its best for providing facilities to them according to their needs.

The college maintains complete transparency in its financial, academic, administrative and auxiliary functions and operates as per norms.

The College is committed to connect all the students whether alumni or exiting, by organizing events like Youth Fest and Alumni Meet every year, which are one the best practices of the college. Internal assessment of the students and discipline are also our best practices.

The College maintains excellent academic record during last several years, which is reflected by the university merit list and overall results of various courses run by the college. To achieve this goal, faculty members are always available to the students for all types of assistance and guidance and conduct internal examination time to time which keep the students engaged in academic activities. 1.1.1 The institution ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well planned and documented process

Response:

Citizens form the backbone of our nation and education forms the backbone of a citizen. In this respect the progress majorly lies in the upliftment of its citizens and hence educational institutes accommodate a lion's share in this process. The foundation stone of a college might physically be attributed to its infrastructure but its soul, undoubtedly lies in the outcome of its academic curriculum

The college takes care to develop confident and innovative individuals and researchers by imparting quality education and training to all, irrespective of caste, creed, religion, province, faith, sex, political affiliation and financial status. It ensures to develop close relationship of students with the outer atmosphere through NCC, NSS and Rovers & Rangers. Various types of seminars, workshops and special lectures are organized from time to time to create awareness, upgradation of knowledge, to develop communication skills which are useful for the future of the students.

The college organizes counseling programs for every new batch of all the classes to make student and Parents aware of the college policies, values & ethics, environment and work culture of the college. The vision, mission and quality policies of the college for new employees and students are displayed on notice boards and standees in the campus common areas for easy accessibility. They are also displayed on the website.

At the beginning of the session, the time table is allocated well in advance and circulated to the teachers on time so that they can prepare their teaching/ session's plans for ensuring effective delivery of the topics. For smooth conduction of the classes, the college has well equipped classrooms with LCD Projectors, Wi-Fi facility, white board etc. and other supporting facilities like library, computer lab and photocopier. The use of smart board makes the content interesting by including photographs and videos related to the topic. Audio visual aids are also used which make the sense organs of the learners activated and they understand minute and difficult parts of the lesson very conveniently. In the same manner, practicals are also being taken and assessed regularly in which students are being polished by eliminating their mistakes or wrong ways, if done. If a student is unable to grasp at the pace of average student, remedial classes are also being taken to cope and help the students.

Most of the departments have their own computerised libraries for the benefit of the students and faculty members. We also have a central digitalised library in the college premises. The library staff makes all the support available to the faculty member and students via providing appropriate and useful books to update their knowledge. A software INFLIBENT/NLIST is also available in the library.

In Physics and Computer Science departments, the college has computer labs. A language laboratory is also there in the B.Ed. department which improves the grammatical mistakes as well as pronunciation of the students.

- Regular written tests, oral tests, discussion in class enable the students to come out with their difficulties.
- Attentiveness in lecture and learning ability is the way to assess the learning levels of the students
- For advanced learners, the institution organizes seminars, talks, guest lectures, speeches, etc.
- Students with enhanced learning ability are motivated to attend workshops & seminars in other colleges & university.
- Student performance is identified on the basis of their intermediate exam score, performance in mid-term tests, practical or oral test taken in class.
- For slow learners, the teacher in class or mentors identify the students and personally counsel them to overcome their weakness, then motivate them to reach their academic goals.
- Extra classes are organized for slow learners to clarify doubts and re-explaining of difficult topics for improving their performance.
- Appropriate counseling helps them to improve their attendance in class and hence their performance.
- For quick/advanced learners, interaction in classrooms, performance in tests, answering and questioning ability is the criteria to evaluate their level of knowledge & understanding.
- Remedial classes are organized to clarify doubts, and explaining of difficult topics. The students can contact teachers personally or in class to clarify their doubts.
- Poor performance or absentees from class are dealt with by sending letters to the parents / guardians of the students
- Mentors are assigned to each class to deal with the problems of students regarding campus or studies.
- Revisions are taken in class to help slow learners to cope up with their difficulties in learning
- Group learning is promoted, which allows the slow learners to develop problem solving capability

2.3 Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1 Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences

Response:

- Discussions, Debates, lab experiments, mini projects & case studies are some of the methods to enhance learning among students
- Students in discussions come up with their opinions & suggestions. Discussion in soft skills and Debates make the students learn in an arguemental way. They learn to stay by their words and make a point.
- Technical education helps students to learn the skills to work in a team. The practical knowledge of a subject is required to understand it in depth.
- Awareness programmes related to social and environmental concern are conducted particularly for students to actively take part in them. They are motivated to work as a team in Cultural programmes, sports activities, cultural fests, where they are made to learn from the experience of each other.
- Lecture methods including black board and power point, interactive methods, group discussion,

subject quiz, educational games, question-answers, etc. motivate the students to participate in class project based learning, computer assisted learning, experiments learning etc. Teaching learning activities are made effective through illustrations/models/specimens.

- PG students are assigned projects under the guidance of faculty members and they complete it by themselves in the time limit given to them.
- Conventional methods and ICT tools including WiFi enabled class rooms with LCD, language lab, smart class rooms, E-learning resources and also mobile apps, which facilitate and promote understanding of subject are used by teachers and students.
- Students are shown the lectures of scientists and Professors of high academic profile from other Universities. Productive use of educational videos is promoted to inculcate among students a zeal and enthusiasm to present their work in a better manner.
- WiFi has been installed to support educational activities
- Students are exposed to job oriented course such as Computer Professional Courses, or BBA, MBA through IGNOU & RTOU.
- Students are guided for online tests, indulged in educational talks and motivational lectures. Teaching through demonstration, virtual aids, periodical industrial visits, exhibitions, paper presentation, quizzes, field work, etc. help the students to learn what they read and study and make it learning for the lifetime.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 Reforms in Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level

Response:

- The college follows the evaluation methods as recommended by the University for External Exams. The answer sheets are evaluated at the Evaluation Centers assigned by the University. Internal assessment is done by the college teachers themselves and the results are communicated to the University.
- There is an annual system of UG Courses.
- There is Semester system for P.G.Courses and the University has a twice an year system of examination.
- Two internal exams and two quizzes are conducted in each semester. There are Seminars/Projects/Assignments besides the theoretical papers. Internal evaluation is 50% of the total.
- Practicals are conducted by external examiners along with internal examiner, the marks are uploaded on the website of the University on the same day after the exam is over.
- The University has the objective pattern in third year of UG.
- College has initiated a time bound internal exam system. A period is fixed for the department to have the exams within which they should conduct and also evaluate for smooth running and transparency of exam system.
- Time table of internal exam is in tune with the academic calendar of the college.
- The answer sheets after evaluation are shown to the students for clearing doubts and they get to know their level of learning & understanding.
- Through continuous monitoring & evaluation the college identifies the students requiring special attention and offers them remedial classes or extra classes to support and enrich the learning behavior of the students.
- Intellectual & skill-based development of the students is evaluated through debates, quizzes, speech and other such competitions. During cultural fest, they are judged for their skills based activities such as Collage, Poster, Rangoli, Best out of waste, foodstalls, etc.
- Progress of the student is discussed with the parents or guardians, especially if it is unsatisfactory or the student needs special attention, or he/she is facing difficulty with learning and understanding. Parent teacher meetings are held in such cases.
- Surprise tests are also taken and question paper is set in accordance to the pattern followed by the University. Faculty members prepare sets of exam Question paper in both subjective & objective format to provide the students a practice and also evaluate their learning and understanding.

2.5.2 Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and variety

Response:

- Students are briefed through an orientation lecture by the teachers about internal assessment, question paper patterns & university exam.
- Tests are conducted by each teacher after completion of a part of the syllabus.
- Internal evaluation tests for practical also are conducted.
- The university norms relating to course –wise examination pattern are communicated to the students through college prospectus and by teachers in their classes. University circulars are circulated regularly among the faculty members & administrative staff, and also displayed on the notice board.
- Evaluation methods are non-bias and students are marked for their content, presentation and validity of answers.
- Internal examination schedule is coordinated by the faculty members of the department & intimated through notice boards.
- The faculty members give class-wise instructions about internal / external examination process and any changes are briefed by subject teachers.
- The attendance of the students is also notified for classroom teaching and evaluation.
- Internal exam answer sheets are shown to the students for self- evaluation and for solving their problems if any.
- Students can freely interact with faculty members regarding grievance about evaluation.
- Students are not allowed to use mobiles / tabs / laptop in exam.
- Teachers notify evaluation process in class / lab including distribution of marks through notices & class counseling and also individually take their problems.
- The assessment report is displayed in the laboratory/ class.
- Staff meetings are conducted to plan and design new and innovative techniques.
- The internal marks are verified by the Principal before sending to the university.

2.5.3 Mechanism to deal with examination related grievances is transparent, time-bound and efficient

Response:

- The mechanism for examination related grievances is followed both at university and college level.
- The college maintains complete transparency in the evaluation. Mechanism to deal with examination related grievances is fully transparent & time bound.
- During Internal Exam, students can report any problem regarding syllabus of Question paper, of illegible / misprints, out of syllabus, wrong roll-list of seating arrangement, etc. for which the teacher-in- charge of examination is consulted.
- Examinations are conducted by the controller of the examination of the university. All the discrepancies faced by the institution are immediately brought to notice of the controller of the examinations & corrections, if any, are done only after getting instructions from the university. The center superintendent immediately apprise the controller of examinations of University over phone.
- Before or after exam, the students can come to the college exam coordinator for the problem. There is an internal college examination committee that deals with the effective implementation of the evaluation reforms regarding the attainment of course outcome & programme outcome.
- The college helps the students through Principal to approach the University for seeking photocopies of answer scripts with reassessment and re-counting of marks in case of unsatisfactory result. Answer scripts from the university can be asked for re-evaluation at the university.

- Grievances such as late filling of application forms, non-receipt of admit card (Hall- Ticket) or wrong entries in the same are communicated to university exam section & resolved at the easiest. College exam office helps the students in filing the application form.
- The date sheet of the examination is released and circulated in the colleges also and any change in the date sheet is immediately communicated to the college or notified by the University on its website.
- The University notifies the exam schedule and center details through website and press media. Any change or modification in the exam schedule or change in Center is notified at the earliest.

2.5.4 The institution adheres to the academic calendar for the conduct of CIE

Response:

- The new session of the college starts in accordance with the University admissions. Results are declared in May and admissions start in June. The UG and PG classes commence in July every year.
- A meeting of Head of the Departments with the Principal is held in the beginning of the session to prepare a schedule of the activities to be held in the session. Time table in charge and his/her team are appointed.
- The college publishes a common programme to the students at the beginning of the session & adheres to it in a time bound manner.
- Internal examination and midterm tests are conducted as per the academic calendar & evaluation process follows in a transparent manner.
- NSS, NCC activity, Rovers and Ranger activities, Literary Society programmes are organized by respective In-charges according to a pre-planned schedule.
- Various departmental societies conduct activities as per the schedule planned by the teachers and displayed in the academic calendar of the college.
- Alumni Meet is held every year on the second Saturday of February.
- A grand Youth Fest is organized for the College students in the month of January or February.
- The annual or Semester Practical exams are conducted as per the instructions and circular of the University..

In terms of infrastructure and its maintenance our College is one of the best Institutions having affiliation with Ch. Charan Singh University, Meerut. The college upgraded its classrooms to facilitate teaching through modern tools and techniques. The college has classrooms with Wi-Fi enabled LCD projectors, tutorial rooms, departmental libraries, seminar halls/rooms and a fully equipped auditorium having 400 seating capacity. The college takes pride in being a differently-abled friendly campus with ramps, lift, special washrooms. The college also has neat and clean lawns, a botanical garden, and water fountain. Our

college library acts as an empowering unit with full of resources.

The college provides medical facility, gymnasium and parking facility. Sports activities play key role in mental & physical development of students. For this we have sports facilities like Basketball, Volleyball, Kabaddi, Kho- Kho, Tug of war, Handball, Athletics (Shot put, High jump, Long jump), Badminton, Chess, Table Tennis and Carrom.

Due to fully smoke free zone, the college provides an eco-friendly environment to its students with the latest initiatives of solar power, rainwater harvesting, Vermi-compost plant and other green initiatives are in the pipeline.

The college has taken measures to address the need for vigilance and security. For safety purpose the college has we have installed CCTV cameras at various corners of the college premises. The class rooms of the College facilitate a blend of traditional and modern modes of teaching with technological aids such as ceiling mounted LCD projectors, roll down screen, smart boards, green boards and podium for faculty.

The objective of the labs are to develop professionals in the discipline of computer and technology with competent technical and analytical skills, leadership potential, innovative research capabilities and work as a team with dedication for the progress of the society.

Community Services:

Increasing inequality leading to crime & violence and climate change due to rapid ecological degradation are the two serious problems, we are facing today. To ameliorate these problems, it is necessary to promote development of rural areas in tune with Gandhian vision of self sufficient villages. In this scenario, **Unnat Bharat Abhiyan** is much needed and highly challenging initiative.

Under **Unnat Bharat Abhiyan**(A Scheme of Government of India) the college has adopted 05 villages namely Kheri Tappa Lawar, Bhatipura, Gejha, Dabathua and Pawli Khurd. College has also adopted one more village, Lakhwaya under NSS programme.

The consumption of adulterated edible items is a major cause of various chronic diseases and health issues. To cope with this problem, Our College has established Food Testing Lab in the Department of Chemistry. The purpose of this laboratory is to enrich the knowledge of students about chemical analysis of contaminated edible products. To meet with the health issues of urban as well as rural dwellers, our college provides food testing facility free of cost.

(ii) Soil and Water Testing Lab:

To serve the community, Specially Western Uttar Pradesh, a holistic approach was adopted with the establishment of **Soil and Water Testing Lab** in the Department of Botany with the following objectives:

(a) Analysis of water qualitative parameters, Salinity, TDS, DO, pH etc. are being examined regularly for the samples brought by the people.

(b) Soil analysis work on parameters of fertility such as N, P, K, pH, Carbon and micro elements (Zinc, Copper etc.) are being examined for samples brought by the farmers and students. For this purpose, we have organized camps at three villages namely Sadbhar (Baghpat), Sisoli & Kheri Tapple Lawar (Meerut).

All the admissions are strictly made through the merit list provided by university. Principal constitute committee for B.Com I, II, III, B.Sc. (Bio) I, II, III, B.Sc. (Maths) I, II, III, B.Sc. (Computer science) I, II, III, B.Ed. I, II and P.G. in Commerce, Economics, English, Maths, Zoology, Botany, Chemistry and Physics. For every class, an admission committee is constituted having a coordinator, two faculty members, one class III and one class IV employee. Firstly physical verification of the documents of a student is done; online submission of fee on college website is done. Finally admissions are confirmed on the university portal. University regularly provide merit list according to vacant seats.

The merit list confirmation provided by the university is informed to the students through SMS. After declaration of last merit list of the university, if there are some vacant seats, the different admission committee prepare merit list according to University Rules. No admission can be done without merit list.

Parents are informed through letters/ mails/ newspapers/ college website about the attendance of their ward in college. College administration does monitoring of classes at the regular basis. College tries its level best to inculcate value education along with curriculum. College always focuses on fair practices in internal and external exam. College strictly follows academic calendar and completes syllabus on time. Internal exams are conducted in college despite non provision of it in U.G. Classes to prepare students for the final exam. Faculty members of college conduct various examinations at U.G. & P.G. level.

To promote learning beyond curriculum the college has signed various MOUs with different kinds of organizations. MOUs have been signed between college and different organization varies across industries, school, colleges, polytechnic, Natak Sanshthan, Trust, and different organization involving in social

welfare schemes. Students and teachers are continuously engaged with these organizations to promote collaborative learning to provide multilayered experience of learning. The college follows transparent method of admission. Admission in college are done through centralize admission process of affiliating university. Students allotted by the university are enrolled in the college by applying as per reservation rules of U.P. Government.

Research and Development: The College is committed to promote quality research and a research development committee is constituted for monitoring and promotion of research. The college has approved research centers and students are enrolled for perusing Ph.D. in different departments. 26 Ph.D. & 02 D.Litt. / D.Sc. were awarded during last five years. Our 25 students were awarded JRF. Post Doctoral fellowship students are provided necessary facilities to pursue research. College has central research lab, computer labs and other labs in departments to promote quality research. The college also organized Pre-Ph.D. Course work in Commerce in 2016 and 2017. Institute has a strong ethical work culture that is based on inclusivity. It observes highest ethical standards in all its activities. Equal opportunities are provided to all individuals irrespective to gender, race, caste, color, creed, language, religion, political or other opinion. Its unique work culture, healthy traditions and ethos have led to the enrollment of 58% girls students and 61% women faculty. Most of the female as well as male teachers are active researchers and inspire the girl students for higher studies. College ensures equal ease to access the resources and opportunities regardless any gender discrimination.

Safety and learning go hand in hand. To utilise fullest potential, the student should be adequately supported and feel safe in the college. Therefore college believes that it is the responsibility of the institution to ensure that students feel safe and welcomed when they enter the college. Following measures are taken as effective safety policies –

1. Proctorial Board of the college includes both male and female members.
2. There are security check points at all campus entries and exists.
3. Strict implementation of anti ragging procedure.
4. Whole campus is under CCTV servillance.

6. College has active girls redressal cell and a women cell.
7. College organizes awareness campaigns on women safety and gender sensitivity through street plays ,rallies,guest lectures and workshops. College has seperate NCC girls wing alongwith a coed unit to motivate girl students for self defence and defence services

To assist girl student's personal , social, educational and carrer problems , college provides a free environment to them-so that they can talk about their issues comfortably to the faculty members. College believes that counselling refers to actively listening to an individual's story and communicating , understanding, respecting and empathizing, clarifying goals and assisting challenged students with decision making process. To meet this belief a women cell of female faculty members is there who aim to resolve whatever the challenges are. In view of the changing social structure and behavior, most important is a face to face conversation with the girls so that they can get an insight to the future prospective of upcoming life.

Counselling is a highly individualized process which involves administrative skills, thinking skills, orientation and planning skills ,time management skills and technological skills for the transformation of the challenged students. Parents are also advised to register their wards complaints regarding any personal academic issue, if any.

College has a provision for girls common room where girls can sit , rest and go for recreation .This room is equipped with drinking water facility , an attached washroom , elegant furniture and indoor games .The room is properly ventilated, well lit , neat and clean to provide a friendly atmosphere to its users.

This room provides a place for socializing , discussion and interaction with each other to the girls.

A sanitary napkin vending machine is also installed in the washroom . Besides this, six other separate toilet complexes are built for girls.

Response:

Waste management indicates the activities and actions required to manage waste from its inception to its final disposal. This includes the collection, transport, treatment and disposal of waste, together with monitoring and regulation of the management process. The college has a well managed solid waste disposal system.

Solid Waste Management-

- Waste bins are provided to all the departments, classes, labs, offices and at different places of the college campus.
- The college has an effective ban on single use polythene.
- The solid wastes other than used in vermicompost plant is regularly collected and disposed off by municipal corporation of Meerut city.

Vermicomposting for the Solid Waste Management-

1. The endeavour of our college to protect the environment is to have vermicomposting facilities in

- the college. It upto a large extent controls the waste material problem in which organic waste produced in college is converted into rich soil using earth worms.
2. Vermicomposting is the most eco-friendly recycling process where organic waste is converted into soil and humus. This recycling processes not only convert organic debris into high quality compost, but the chemical changes that the debris undergoes make the nutrients easily available to the plants.
 3. It's a natural way in which organic waste break down into nutrient-rich compost. It also reduces heavy metals and toxins formed in sewage slush and helps to reduce the presence of pathogens in organic matter.
 4. The department of life science assigned a project of vermicomposting for the students of P.G.
 5. The compost developed in it has advantages over chemical fertilizers. It restores microbial population which includes nitrogen fixers, phosphate solubilizers etc. It provides major and micro-nutrients to the plants, improves soil texture and water holding capacity of the soil.

The main objective of it is to process the organic material as quickly and efficiently as possible.

Liquid Waste Management:-

- For it, we have installed plastic drums to collect liquid waste produced in department's labs. The chemical waste is collected into small bins from wash basins of laboratories and then collected in the big ones. The waste so collected is damaged by R.K enterprises regularly.
- An MOU was signed between Principal, D.N College, Meerut and propertier, R.K Enterprises, to collect the hazardous chemical waste and residue chemicals of Botany, Chemistry and Zoology departments of this college twice a week regularly.

7.1.6 Rain water harvesting structures and utilization in the campus

Response:

Many cities in India and all over the world are dealing with depleting water supply, marked by falling groundwater levels, vanishing water bodies and in poor drainage system. Therefore, the endeavour of our college to protect the environment is to have water harvesting facilities in the college. In the central lawn of college campus, two new water harvesting system in addition to existing one, have been established to maintain the water level. 90% of rain water of the college is drained and preserved by this process

It is a sustainable process that helps in preserving rain water for different purposes and for the future need as well. Our college adopted surface runoff rain water harvesting system. It is the collection, accumulation, treatment, purification and storing of stormwater for its eventual reuse.

.The system of Rain-water harvesting that we adopted for our campus was invented by Professor Khare from IIT. 100 Feet meter pipe line (usually 80 feet meter length) is used. 20 feet extra pipeline is used for the future point of view. If water level gets more down, even then 100 meter pipeline will work in maintaining water level. Pipes used for this system are Net pipes and Plain pipes. The special net cloth used on upper level is called JIO Fabric and is used as the replacement of raw pabbles. It is a successful invention of Prof. Khare as it double filters the water two times.

Rain-Water harvesting systems were inaugurated by Padam Shri Dr. Anil Prakash Joshi under the banner of HESCO (an association to save environment).

- Alumni meet gives equal opportunity to every alumnus to share his experience and suggestions for the progress of the college.
- Various cultural activities such as dancing and singing are enjoyed by alumni.

(iv) Evidence of Success:-

- Alumni meets are successfully conducted and number of members is increasing every year.
- Dr. N.K. Taneja, Vice Chancellor of CCS university, Meerut; Sri Anil Km Sharma, Retd. IPS officer and member of NRI commission, Punjab; Dr. Satish Chandra, Retd. Judge, Allahabad High Court; Vaidya Balendu Prakash, Padma Sri etc. are the alumni who share their valuable time for the

counselling of young students of the college.

- Wonderful media coverage of the Alumni Meet facilitates old students to join Alumni Association and connect once again with their lost friends and batch mates.
- College website has all the detailed information regarding joining Alumni Association. Facebook and Whatsapp groups have brought the far and fetched alumni closer as a family.

One day alumni meet program is not enough to cover it's all the aspects and can be better covered up in a couple of day programme.

Alumni Meet expenditure is supported by the college management while alumni are inclined to catch the needs of the students with their own capabilities and resources. This spirit is praise worthy but there should be a separate provision for financial support.

5 BEST PRACTICE

TITLE OF THE BEST PRACTICE: USE OF SOLAR POWER PANNEL IN CAMPUS

OBJECTIVES OF THE PRACTICE: Solar power is the conversion of the energy from the sun to usable electricity so it helps us reduce our electricity bills and reduce our dependency on non-renewable sources of energy such as coal and petroleum. It is a clean fuel. Use of solar energy does not cause any pollution and hence it is not harmful to the environment of our college campus. Use of solar energy in our campus helps us to reduce air pollution which for India is a primary concern as on date.

THE CONTEXT: Electricity is a great boon which transformed the human civilization from Stone Age to modern era. Generation of clean energy is a challenge to current society. Electricity generated from fossil fuels polluted our universe and also resulted in depletion of fossil fuels. It also led to global warming and green house effects.

THE PRACTICE: The endeavour of our college is to protect the environment and we have taken lot of energy initiatives. One of the most important is producing our own electricity by installing the best solar power system in campus We have facility of solar street lights in whole campus. During session 2018-19 our managing committee provided to college 50wp Grid Rooftop solar panel system worth Rs. 25,00,000. The area covered by this Grid Rooftop solar panel system is 8-10m²/1KWP. The average production of electricity by this system is 1100-1350 units per KW per year. The configuration of this solar Rooftop system depicts >300Wp PV modules and string inverter of 50 KWP. They operate with a free resource and do not produce greenhouse gas emissions when converting sunshine to electric power.

THE CONTEXT:

Our college paperless or paper-free working is aimed to a work environment in which the use of paper is eliminated or greatly reduced. This is done by converting documents and other papers into digital form, a process known as digitization. PRODUCTIVITY is the most compelling benefit of going paperless in the workplace. Electronic documents are instantly and simultaneously available to everyone who needs them. Our paperless working practice is able to reduce expenditure on paper purchase as well as maintenance expenses of copiers, toner, fax machines and other devices. We realized that Employees in paper-intensive businesses spend up to 40% of their time looking for documents, and 7% of documents are lost or misfiled and delayed

THE PRACTICE:

Our college office is fully facilitated with computers and Wi-Fi to each office employee so that they may do the digital recordation of information. From last session online payment of fees system is introduced in our college. Amongst the other added colleges of our university our college is the first one to take this initiative for the time and paper saving of students. Student's identity cards are digitalized to excess easy recordation of student's details. College notices and necessary information are circulated by the help of what Sapp group and emails as college has records of all the employees' i.e. teaching and non teaching staff's mail address and mobile numbers for online easy and fast correspondence. Student's feedbacks and parents feedbacks are also taken online instead of papers. Our Alumni association is the best example of online and digital user. Alumni association joining process is online and forms are filled and collected without waste of paper. We conduct online quiz and internal exams to minimize the wastage of paper.

THE EVIDENCE:

Our teaching and non teaching staffs are well trained to access and utilize the internet facility, WIFI and computers for more and more online works. The result of it is our less messy and tidy departments and office due to very rare wastage of papers. We also motivate our students to save trees by saving papers and help to maintain our environment and natural resources.

Problem Encountered and Resources Required: The problem we face in our paperless work target is that a great percentage of our students come from rural areas and they are deprived of fast internet services so they face problem of poor connectivity and sometimes our online information reach late to them and we have to adopt normal correspondence method to send some notice to them.

7.3 Institutional Distinctiveness

7.3.1 Describe/Explain the performance of the institution in one area distinctive to its vision, priority and thrust

Response:

Lab to Land Programme

In changing climate scenario, we are facing heats of global problems like environmental pollution at very local level and that too in our own backyards. Every year, the cities around Delhi are choked due to worst air quality index during winter months. This situation is compounded by crop residues burning incidences in states namely, Western UP, Punjab and Haryana. The already sequestered carbon is released back to environment by burning of agricultural wastes and it leads to accumulation of green house gases.

College being a place for academic excellence, can not remain aloof from the current socio-economic issues. It is a great place to start and there are many opportunities for involvement as a student. The concept of ``Going Green' is a need of the day and our college is committed to initiate green practices in the campus. For this college interacts with various stakeholders on a voluntary basis and believes in ``Care and Share''. People care deeply about environmental issues but unfortunately have no mechanism to share the same. College feels that it is the responsibility of academic institutions to share their ideas and work with the society and to develop a mindset comfortable with eco friendly practices.

Installation of Rain Water Harvesting units, Vermi Composting Unit Solar Power Panels for Street lightening and 50 KWP Solar Power Panel for the whole campus are our measure steps towards this goal. Vermi composting recycles organic waste in ecofriendly manner and converts it into soil and humus. It restores microbial population and provides major and micro nutrients to the plants and improves soil texture. In newly constructed building of Physics department, low consumption electronic based equipments are installed to save electricity and the structure is designed to have a well lit look during college timings.

We have collaborated with industries, academic institutions and NGO's for the exchange of technology and methodology to empower our selves as a leader of ``Go Green'' initiative in Meerut District.

As a social responsibility measure, college has established a Food Testing Lab, Soil and Water Testing Lab and a Mashroom Cultivation Centre in the campus. The department of Botany, D.N. College, Meerut is active in soil and water testing activities since 2013. The first camp was organized at Naunchandi mela, Meerut in collaboration with the district science club, Meerut. In 2014, a camp was organized at children science congress program at baranbanki. Honorable Dr. A.P.J. Abdul Kalam, former president of India and professor Yash Pal, former chairman of U.G.C. attended and inspected the program and appreciated it. In December 2014, a camp was also organized at national children science congress held at B.H.U., Varanasi.

In 2017-2018, a water and soil testing centre was permanently established in the botany department, which was inaugurated by Sri Dayanand Gupta Ji, Honorary Secretary of the college. In the laboratory, water contaminants TDS, DO, PH salinity are tested. In soil related work, 8 to 12 elements are tested to know the deficiency of essential elements. In food testing lab, different edibles such as milk, cheese, spices, oil, ghee etc. are tested for contamination. This lab is fully equipped with testing equipments and chemical reagents.

Considering the fact that every second child is malnourished in rural western UP, D N College took an initiative to provide a sustainable solution for this problem. Promotion of mushroom cultivation in this region will prove to be an effective strategy to control this menace. It is also helping landless farmers and women entrepreneurs in this field. Our students are serving as brand ambassadors to promote entrepreneurship among youth of this region. Mushrooms are rich source of proteins, fibres and other micro-nutrients. Our efforts are progressing towards ensuring availability of this health food to rural masses. Along with providing technical know-how regarding different process, we are supporting farmers with quality spawn and other materials. Using our academic and industrial linkages, we organize training cum awareness programs for farmers and entrepreneurs. We have standardized different composting protocols for mushroom cultivation using locally available agricultural wastes. Also, dried leaves and other organic litters generated on campus are composted in an environment friendly manner. In our laboratories, we are cultivating seven different medicinal mushroom species viz. White button and Portobello mushroom (*Agaricus bisporus*), King Oyster (*Pleurotus eryngii*), Shiitake (*Lentinula edodes*), Pink oyster (*P. djamor*), Yellow Oyster (*P. citrinopileatus*), Grey Oyster (*P. ostreatus*) and Milky mushroom (*Calocybe indica*). These mushrooms require different environmental conditions for their vegetative and reproductive growth so, they can be grown year round using low cost seasonal cultivation methodologies. As a participating institute under Unnat Bharat Abhiyan (A flagship programme of MHRD, Govt. of India), our college is promoting mushroom cultivation and organic farming practices among farming community of selected villages. We are using composting yard of our partner institute Meerut College for making compost using zero energy poly tunnel process. Along with cultivation, the medicinal properties of shiitake mushroom is also studied.

Few health benefits of these mushroom species are as follows :-

White Button Mushroom provides 22 K Cal/100 gm of food energy and excellent source of B vitamins, riboflavin, niacin and pantothenic acid. Fresh mushrooms are also good source of dietary mineral phosphorus. Oyster mushrooms are widely cultivated and used in Kerala where they are also used to create mycelium bricks, mycelium furniture and leather like products. Shiitake mushrooms are a bit more difficult to grow since their mycelium is not as aggressive and requires a longer incubation time. They contain compounds that support heart health, boost immune system and may even be able to help fight cancer and tumors. They are low in Sodium and Calories but offer good amounts of fiber, B vitamins and some minerals. Ganoderma mushrooms are used in traditional Chinese medicines. They are effectively cultivated on hardwood logs or sawdust/woodchips. It can grow on, grain and wood logs.

At present, the college is registered with 'National Institutional Ranking Framework' (NIRF) and also certified by ISO9001 : 2015.

The college has distinct reputation in maintaining discipline and academic environment. It remains the first choice for the admission of the students even the girls too. Various societies of the students have been formed for their skill development in all the departments. This year the college has adopted five villages under 'Unnat Bharat Abhiyan' scheme of Government of India. The college has made various attempts for the social awareness through organizing camps in above different villages. The college is well known in the field of research activities, as more than 200 research papers have been published in SCOPUS Journals till date by our faculty members and research scholars.

Under Industry Linkage programme, various industries have sanctioned Minor Research Project to our faculty members for discharging the social responsibilities. The college is imparting social responsibilities to the villagers through organizing camps for soil and water testing. The college is providing food testing facilities for the society.
